


Intro

RQ: How can poetry help to explore a sense of 'belonging' for staff working in higher education?

I think I know what sort of person I am. But then I think, But this stranger will imagine me quite otherwise when he or she hears this or that to my credit, for instance that I have a position at the university: the fact that I have a position at the university will appear to mean that I must be the sort of person who has a position at the university. But then I have to admit, with surprise, that, after all, it is true that I have a position at the university. And if it is true, then perhaps I really am the sort of person you imagine when you hear that a person has a position at the university. But, on the other hand, I know I am not the sort of person I imagine when I hear that a person has a position at the university. Then I see what the problem is: when others describe me this way, they appear to describe me completely, whereas in fact they do not describe me completely, and a complete description of me would include truths that seem quite incompatible with the fact that I have a position at the university.

Limitations

- **1.** Small sample size limited to a single sample of poems (18).
- 2. Subjective nature of poetry analysis may limit generalizability of findings.
- **3. Only English-language poems** potentially creates a bias towards certain attitudes or behaviours.

Strengths

- **1. Rich poetic data** permits sharing complex, ambiguous and contradictory ideas in few words
- **2.** Fosters both openness and anonymity through creative use of language, and poetic identities
- **3.** Poetry doesn't hide its own constructedness encouraging rigorous critical understanding of the research process

Recommendations

- 1. Focus on nurturing a sense of community and with it the capacity to engender action.
- 2. If higher education institutes truly seek to be places of positive societal benefit that uphold inclusive values, then they should also seek to celebrate (and reward) these same values amongst their staff.
- 3. In addition to celebrating these values, institutes should also provide support in helping staff to effectively navigate the substantial number of different qualities that are needed to fulfil a role in higher education.
- 4. Meaningfully recognise and encourage the deep-rooted commitment that is shared by many staff to the potential of higher education for transformative impact.
