Exciting events

The Dennis MacLeod Research Space

We are investing in our research resources and community this spring by establishing the Dennis MacLeod Research Space at our Burghfield House base in Dornoch. Named after the late **Dennis MacLeod**, the Sutherland-born businessman whose financial gift was the basis for the founding of the Centre in 2005, the space comprises an enhanced research room for the use of our research and taught students, associate staff, visiting staff and, potentially, we hope, for historical researchers in the broader local community.

Equipped with laptops, oral history recorders and social facilities, the space builds on the Centre's commitment in our current Research Strategy to 'greater enhancement of, and investment in, physical and digital resources' here in Dornoch and beyond.
