James Hunter Dissertation Prize

We are delighted to announce **Joy Rollinson** as this year's winner of the James Hunter Dissertation Prize.

Joy's dissertation *Propaganda in the Cinemas: Short Films as a Method of Propaganda in Britain during the Second World War (1939-1945)* examines how the Ministry of Information infused key propaganda messages with comedy and drama, reaching a large number of people through the popularity of the cinema. These short films, the central focus of Joy's dissertation, are not a particularly well-known part of the British government's wartime communication strategies, and Joy has delved into their content to explore what they tell us, offering a unique contribution to Second World War propaganda history. Joy graduated with First Class Honours in BA (Hons) History.

This was a brilliant opportunity to chat to attendees and share details about the cutting edge research and Humanities study options at [UHI](#).




November

Dornoch Autumn Highland Festival

We were very excited to be part of the Dornoch Autumn Highland Festival Fortnight, following the success of events in the spring.

On the 24 October our **Dr Nicola Martin** gave a talk - Jacobitism and Clanship in the North Highlands. This talk explored the North Highlands' experiences of the Jacobite era (1688-1766), considering what drove clans, or individuals, to declare for one side or another and how this changed over the eighteenth century.



Dr Jim MacPherson provided a talk and walking tour of Dornoch on 28 October to discover how the town and its people were involved in the British Empire since the eighteenth century.



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Research and Publications

Landscapes of Protest Project

We are excited to share first updates on our Leverhulme Trust funded project, [Landscapes of Protest](#). It is led by **Dr Iain Robertson** ([UHI](#)) and **Professor Carl Griffin** ([Sussex](#)) and supported by Postdoctoral Research Assistant **Dr Juliette Desportes** ([UHI](#)). The collaborative project investigates how rural workers in the Highlands and Islands defended their livelihoods and ways of life in the age of radical 'improvements' which transformed the social and economic basis of Scottish agriculture, 1750 – c. 1820.

Every month (or so), we share a [blog](#) post or personal reflections on histories and geographies of protest and resistance in Scotland and further afield from an expert in the field.

Dr Iain Robertson, Prof Carl Griffin and Dr Juliette Desportes recently spent a week in Argyll where they visited Inveraray Castle archives and the archive of Argyll and Bute Council in Lochgilphead.

Dr Iain Robertson and **Dr Juliette Desportes** both delivered papers at this year's Scottish Local History Forum (SLHF) conference, 'Popular Protest in a Scottish Local History Context', held in Paisley on Saturday 25 October.



Research and Publications

In October one of our PGRs, **Mhairi Ferrier**, presented a paper at the [Scottish Archaeological Forum's conference, Building Bridges: Connecting Scotland's Archaeological Community](#), in Edinburgh.



Mhairi discussed elements of her PhD research in her paper, 'A Thatched House in Torlum: Exploring the Boundaries of Archaeological Practice'. By reflecting on a day of archaeological fieldwork, Mhairi considered the multidisciplinary approach of her project and what it means to complete emotionally engaged archaeology. The paper formed part of a panel called '(In)Tangible Pasts' which included other colleagues working on elements of Gaelic and Hebridean heritage, culture and archaeology. Dr Iain MacInnes had a busy few weeks presenting at conferences in October/November. Firstly he attended the Annual Baltic Military History Conference at the University of Tartu, Estonia 30-31 October, where he was speaking on the theme of "Different theatre, different rules? War and the urban environment during the Second Scottish War of Independence (1332-1357)." You can now [watch the recording](#). He then attended another conference - Landscapes of War and Fear in Oslo Norway from the 4-5 November, speaking on the topic of "A (lack of) wartime defence? Scotland's urban communities and their response to war during the Second Scottish War of Independence(1332-1357)." He finished up by speaking at the Society of Highland & Island Historical Research event on 13 November.



Our **Dr Nicola Martin** was in Stockholm on 1 October to deliver a paper at the Department of Military History, [Swedish Defence University](#). Her talk examined how the concept of the Laws of War, while promoting moderation, also served to justify state-sponsored violence in both conventional and unconventional warfare.



This was a brilliant opportunity to continue developing the special relationship between UHI Centre for History and the Swedish Defence University, and follows the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding in 2024, facilitated by our **Dr Kathrin Zickermann**.

Dr Nicola Martin was also at the [University of St Andrews](#) on 13 November to deliver a talk as part of the Institute of Scottish Historical Research's seminar programme. Her paper 'Principle, Politics, Patronage? Highland Whig Loyalism during the Jacobite era' links to her current research interests.
